
# Year 2 - Power of Reading




bird, we then watched real hatchings on youtube and compared the differences. We created fact files on both creatures and sorted out amazing facts for our class big book of evidence.

## Mr McGovern visits Cambodia

The trip to Cambodia was a special and amazing experience for myself and the other parishioners and staff St Albans. The parish has been working with The Parish of St. John the Apostle for many years and helps to fund the 'rice soup' programme in the more remote areas of Siem Reap. Providing education and food are a big part of the work that they do. We were privileged to see some of this work first hand and below details some of the experiences.

#### Ta Om

Ta Om is a village on the banks of the river about 60km SW of Siem Reap.

The parish helped to build an education centre which provides schooling for the children of the village, and feeds them rice soup, a nourishing broth of rice and vegetables made of pork, black pudding and fish where available.

The children were so patient and well mannered, always sitting quietly during prayers before they ate, despite how hungry they must have been.

After lunch we went to Mass in the local community, and visited some local families delivering help packs, which we paid for using donations raised from our school. These packs contained rice, oil salt and soap. We also got the children small gifts of colouring books and pencils which were greatly appreciated.

#### **Anlong Pi**

Anlong Pi is situated next to a huge rubbish dump. Most of the people work on the dump salvaging plastic for recycling. Alan and Alison (retired teachers from the Wirral) have set up a school in this area focusing on the children of the families who work on the dump.

Feeding the children is an important part of the work and the school is aiming to be self-sufficient by growing its own vegetables and farming fish.

The work they are doing is inspirational and will be a valuable link to future trips made by

### **Kompong Kleang**

Another day saw a visit to Kompong Kleang, a village on stilts. This is because during the rainy season the water levels rise and the village becomes cut off. This is a very poor community, where the rice soup programme helps massively. I ran a couple of sessions with a group of about of about 60 children, where I played some games, did some songs and we also practised some English. The children were amazing

This floating village is in the middle of a vast lake which took 2 hours to get to by boat. The community is served by a floating church, which also doubles as an education centre. This is because the current school is sinking and is no longer safe, as are many of the local homes. Children make their way by boat, most without adult supervision. This is probably the place with the most extreme poverty. We visited 2 families after school, rice soup and These houses were very mass. small with large families living in This experience really hit home how challenging daily life is

for many in Cambodia.

### Home of Joy

Close by the church is an orphanage run by the Missionary Sister of Charity. This was home to some very vulnerable children, most of who had been given up by their families. The children were delighted with the toys bought with some of the donation money raised.

Overall it was an incredible, challenging, moving and inspiring experience. We look forward to using this trip to strengthen our bond between the parishes and the school both in Cambodia and at home with St. Albans. A massive thank you to you all for the money that you raised. Look out for more fundraising projects

### Sacramental preparation


